

CANADIAN CANNABIS SURVEY

Use of cannabis for non-medical purposes



People reported using a variety of products for non-medical purposes in the past 12 months. The most common was dried leaf/ flower followed by edibles, hashish/ kief, solid concentrates, liquid concentrates, and vape pens. A smaller % reported using beverages. 41%

A higher % of males reported both past 12-month and past 30-day use of cannabis for non-medical purposes compared to females.



People between the ages of 16-24 years reported cannabis use in the past 12 months at a % that was double that of respondents aged 25 years+.

People who consume cannabis for non-medical purposes use a variety of methods. The 5 most common were smoking, eating, vaping with portable and non-portable vaporizers, and dabbing.

More than half of those who used cannabis for non-medical purposes in the past 12 months reported using monthly or less frequently.


25% reported using cannabis for non-medical purposes daily or almost daily.



Driving and cannabis

Have you driven a vehicle within 2 hours of using cannabis?



How long ago did this last happen?




Overall, 39% of those who used cannabis in the past 12 months said they had driven within 2 hours of using cannabis in their lifetime. This was more common among males than females.

Have you driven within 2 hours of using cannabis and alcohol?



How long ago did this last happen?



Overall, 25% of those who drove within 2 hours of using cannabis also said they had driven after using cannabis in combination with alcohol. This was more common among males than females.

Have you driven within 2 hours of using cannabis and other drugs?



How long ago did this last happen?



Overall, 10% of those who drove within 2 hours of using cannabis also said they had driven after using cannabis in combination with another drug other than alcohol or tobacco.

Have you been a passenger in a vehicle driven by someone within 2 hours of using cannabis



Almost a third of Canadians (16+) said they had been a passenger in a vehicle driven by someone who had used cannabis within 2 hours of driving at some point in their life.



3% of those who used cannabis for non-medical purposes in the past 12 months reported having an interaction with law enforcement related to driving under the influence of cannabis.



SOCIAL ACCEPTABILITY


More Canadians (16+) report the regular use of alcohol to be socially acceptable than regular use of tobacco, e-cigarettes, or cannabis.



Completely/somewhat acceptable %


PERCEIVED RISK OF HARM

Fewer Canadians (16+) perceive regular cannabis consumption as having moderate or great risk of harm, when compared to regular use of alcohol, tobacco, or e-cigarettes.

OBSERVATIONS OF USE IN PUBLIC PLACES



57% of Canadians (16+) have noticed the odour of cannabis and suspected recent use at the location and 47% have noticed someone smoking what appeared to be cannabis in public in the past 12 months.

27% did not notice any use/odour of cannabis in public.

CANNABIS INSIDE THE HOME









25% said that someone had smoked cannabis inside their home in the past 12 months.



71% said no one used cannabis inside their home.

OPINIONS ON DRIVING AND CANNABIS

81% of Canadians (16+) believe cannabis use impairs one's ability to drive, compared to 75% in 2017.



This opinion is more common (87%) among those who had not used cannabis in the past 12 months. compared to those who had (61%).

The majority of Canadians (16+) do not specify a time for when it is safe to drive after cannabis use.

33% say it depends on the person, quantity, and method of use.



21% report they do not know when it would be safe to drive.



49% of Canadians think that it is likely or extremely likely that a person would be caught by police for driving while under the influence of alcohol.







23% report the same likelihood for being caught driving under the influence of cannabis.
